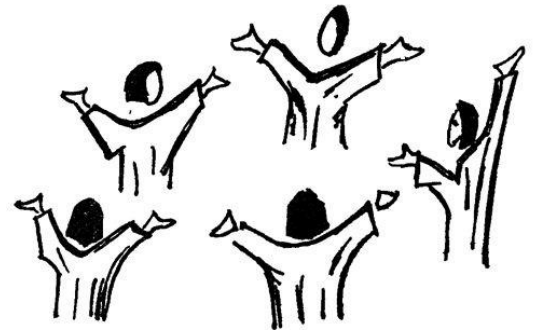

Celebrate the Lord

Saying something good about the Lord. Those are the words that come to mind when I hear the expression “Celebrate the Lord.” The word together also comes to mind. It reminds me that all his children are of great importance to him: “Because you are precious in my eyes” (Isaiah 43: 4). We are so precious that he wished to establish himself in each one of us. Saying something good and together...because our God is present among us and also in each of our hearts.



I have just lived another Sunday of Faith and Sharing. It was nice to see us all turned toward our witness of the day, in an atmosphere of silence, but a very attentive silence. Then after, we went in small teams with the Lord truly present in us by his Holy Spirit, because we could really feel in our hearts joy, peace, kindness and love.

How great is the Lord! In the Bible, many times we see people run toward him, looking for him, not always for the right reasons; nevertheless, we can easily imagine the energy put to use. And since the Holy Spirit is universally present, my faith tells me throughout the day: *be careful, the Lord is present*. Present even in my brother that I cannot stand, in that lady that I find slightly repulsive, in that priest whose sermons are rather boring, etc... All such things are an invitation to be attentive to the Lord's presence.

During the Christmas Holidays, I visited my family. Among those visited was my uncle who was hospitalized; an uncle who at times was violent; an uncle whom many had condemned, it seems, and even rejected. And yet, for me, the Lord was really present during that brief encounter. It was on the feast day of Saint Brother André, January 6th. Furthermore, my uncle told me that he was making the necessary efforts to return to a state of good health. Surely, it requires faith, but there is so much faith, and we know it especially at Faith and Sharing.

Yes, let us celebrate the Lord, but we cannot do it without the supreme gift of his life for us. He went to the very limits of love so as to allow us to partake in very nourishing and heart to heart exchange. Is he not the way, the truth and life? Celebrating the Lord in the Holy Eucharist that brings us together is the summit of the celebration. Each human being is indispensable because the Lord came to tell us that he had come to save all the Father's children, without exception. No wonder then that this brings us an atmosphere of thanksgiving!

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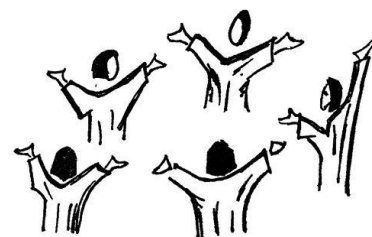

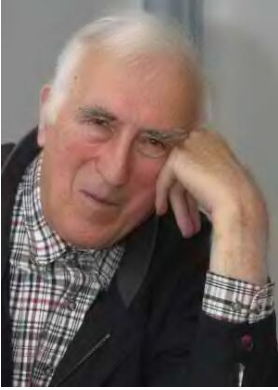

So, around 3:30 p.m., I went to get her and I had to wait in the school hallway until she came out. As usual, she saw me first among all the other parents or grandparents. She was surprised and happy to see me or else she would have had to take the school bus. She had something very important to tell me.

In one hand, she had her lunch bag and in the other some object that I was not able to see. I told her she had forgotten her winter pants and that she had to fetch them in her locker.

Coming out of school, we headed for my car while talking of many things. She sat in the back seat.

On our way home, she told me that, with the other pupils of her class, she had made a gingerbread cookie. She told me that she had made it especially for the person who comes to Faith and Sharing in a wheelchair. And she added that she would give it to that person because that is the person who suffers the most (alone).



Once at our place, she showed it to her Grandmother and told her for whom she had made it. She also added that while doing it, she had thought of the person who was suffering.

Around five o'clock, her father came to pick her up and she said very little because he was in a hurry to get home.

The following morning, we went, as we always do before Christmas, to the Faith and Sharing meeting, especially for the live enactment of the Nativity scene. For the past several years, Audrey participates with her sister and her two cousins ages seven and nine.

This year, her sister Ève represented the angel Gabriel and Audrey, assisted by her seven year old cousin, had the role of the star that appeared to the shepherds.

As in the preceding years, they sang, at the end of the live crèche, the song of the children of Israel. That song was sung by Ève for the first time at Faith and Sharing some five years ago. This year, all the participants sang the song at the beginning and at the end of the day.

Just before leaving at the end of the day, Micheline and I were busy wishing Merry Christmas to all those who were close to us.

And at the moment, when we were close to Maria, the girl in the wheelchair, we saw Audrey give her the small cookie that she had kept in her bag since the day before.

Maria's face glowed with joy and happiness. And she told Audrey that was the nicest gift she had ever received. Audrey was so glad to see Maria's face so warmly bright.

Micheline and I had not realized what a gesture of love our little girl wanted to do for Christmas. We were probably too busy with our own preparations for Christmas and forgot all about such a nice gift made by a child.

And this morning, I realized, with Micheline, that we had also received the nicest gift that we could receive through Audrey's charitable action. No doubt Jesus showed us that Christmas is for children and for persons that are alone and suffering. It also reminded me that God has given us the greatest gift of all, his son Jesus. And I thank him for putting in the heart of our little girl his true Love.

I told you this story to share with you the love and joy that our grand children give us.

Greetings,

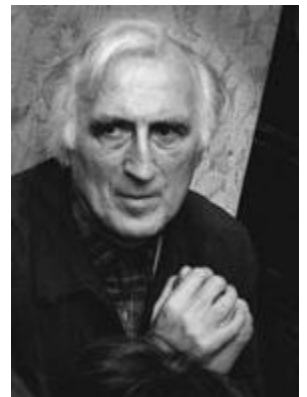

Celebrate the Lord

For the last dozen years or so that I have been involved with the annual Faith and Sharing Retreat in Cleveland we have delighted in focusing on a theme. We find a song that echoes the words of the theme and Scriptures that celebrate the theme for morning and evening prayer. And we make nametags. Very special nametags.

We provide every participant with a colorful lanyard with a 3 x 4 inch card in a plastic sleeve. On the card we print their name and group number, and the plastic sleeve serves as a handy place to store their room key and dining card. But also attached to the lanyard hook is a thematic symbol cut from brightly colored Artfoam, a flexible craft item that, over the years, has taken the shape of a peace sign, a hand, a heart, a loaf of bread, a cross, and a lantern, just to name a few. And that's just the beginning.

Since we are all "called by name" by one another and the God who made us, we invite retreatants to decorate these large dangling symbols with letters that spell out their name. Then they add sparkles and other Artfoam shapes, and plastic gems we call "bling." We dedicate an entire table to this creative dimension of our four days where new friends work together, share the glue, compliment each other's handiwork, and learn names too. It is a joyful table, running over with imagination and helpfulness.



Some of our core members delight in sorting the letters and arranging the shapes by color and size. They wander over to this table during every break and after every meal. They monitor the craftiness and comment on the finished product. The nametag table is like a well in the center of town. It is where retreatants meet to add a little more color to somebody's day or celebrate somebody else's name. We made nametags into a ministry.

Just as no two retreatants are alike, each nametag is a unique creation. Some are very simple; others are layered with rainbows of color and meaningful symbols. The nametag becomes a very special keepsake from the Faith and Sharing experience. I still have every one I have made over the years. Others say the same.

The nametag experience is a quiet way to "Celebrate the Lord." It invites and allows for loads of expression. Each nametag tells a story and often serves as a ready invitation to learn a new name and share a special moment with one or two others. In Cleveland, we "Celebrate the Lord" with color and glue. Maybe that is why so many friends return year after year. We are bonded together by the grace of the four days. And Lord, that is something to celebrate.

May God bless you. May he always keep you in his love now and forever. May the Blessed Virgin always show you her love and compassion.

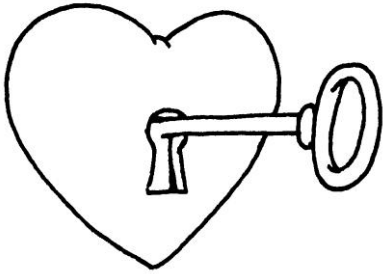

Yes, I earnestly beseech you to give me true love and peace of heart.

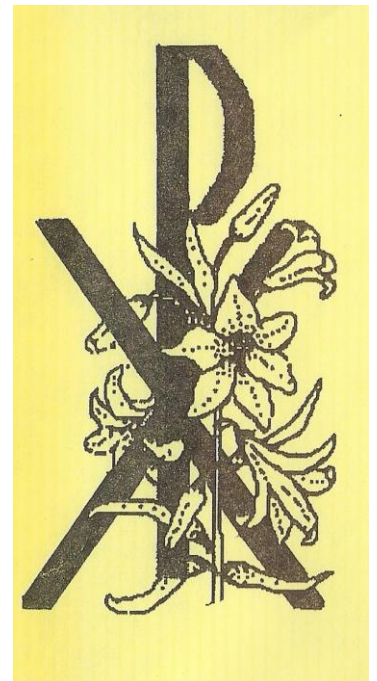

Fortieth Anniversary of Faith and Sharing Quebec

Historical Account

Some forty years ago, from August 8 to August 14, Jean Vanier gave a six-day retreat at *Mont Saint-Sacrement, Valcartier*. Many persons were deeply touched by the message given by Jean.

A dynamic team of volunteers is established and wants to organize other retreats. Preoccupied with the desire to reach out to the poor, Jean suggests: "Maybe we could descend from the mountain... Maybe Jesus waits for us in the lower part of the city." Such a suggestion really impresses some persons who work in the underprivileged sections of the city. During the summer of 1972, priests, religious and lay people who strongly believe in such a project prepare with great enthusiasm the first popular retreat, free and open to all, at the *Ste-Angèle* parish of *St-Malo*, in the *St-Sauveur* district. That retreat attracts people of different social classes who live an experiment of fraternity, unconditional acceptance, and sharing the Word of God. These people want to prolong this new way of being Church that finds its roots in the deep desire of humans who assemble and share with one another. In March of 1973, Faith and Sharing holds its first day of prayer in the basement of *St-Roch* parish. And in August of the same year, a second popular retreat is organized animated by Jean Vanier at the *General Hospital* of Quebec.

Today

Since then, Faith and Sharing Québec, among others, offers monthly days of prayer that are presently held at *l'Institut de Réadaptation en Déficience Physique de Québec (François-Charon Centre)*, popular retreats and weekends of spiritual renewal. Those activities, all inspired by Jean Vanier's spirituality, contain four important elements: the Word of God given in a very simple and clear way and based on everyday life; silent adoration (*katimavik*), sharing of the Word in small groups and the Eucharistic celebration, not counting the fraternal meals that favor sharing.

Invitation

It is in a spirit of thanksgiving to the Lord that we want to underline all that we have lived since 1971. We heartily invite you to come and celebrate with us on June 17 and 18 2011 at the *Centre Durocher, 290, rue de Carillon, Québec*. The theme that will be developed during those two days is based on Jean Vanier's spirituality: "*Accepting differences builds a more human world*".
