Welcoming the Stranger

When I read the theme suggested for the October bulletin "Heart to Heart", immediately wonderful memories from my childhood filled my heart. Our very small house was always very hospitable even though we were a family of eleven. We were called: "The Dumont on the Hill". We were close to Saint-Michel-Archange Hospital (psychiatric hospital, today the Centre Robert-Giffard - Dufrost and de la Jemmarais Pavilions), and we frequently met, with great respect and dignity, the residents of those Centers that many would call "the strangers". When one of them came to stay with us to help my father with the farm, my mother insisted that we call him "Mister" before saying his name.

Then, there were neighbors that were not natives of Quebec, and who spoke more often in English than in French and who were not Catholics. "They are our neighbors", my mother would say and she always greeted them with a beautiful smile. Those "strange" neighbors would babysit us, the two small ones, while the rest of the family would go to midnight Mass. On Christmas day, it was our turn to babysit their children while they went to their religious services in the afternoon. We found it strange that they would leave in the afternoon to go to "their Mass". This took place in the 40's and 50's.

So throughout the years, we were brought up to welcome and respect each person with dignity, no matter what were his origins, his music, his mother tongue, his religion or his mental health. I give thanks to God for my mother's open heart attitude.

I firmly believe that my desire to become a missionary in foreign countries was a result of what I had lived at home. But how could that be done, since in grade five, during the Geography courses, my sisters and I, heard that the city of Sherbrooke was the "Queen of the Eastern Townships". Because of the family's poor financial situation, it was way too far from our small village. Well, during the 60's, I was a teacher for three years in Sherbrooke.

My wish to become a missionary was finally realized in 1968 as I left to go and live on the INDIAN RESERVATIONS in Northern Alberta. Then, in 1990, I left for RWANDA, Africa, and in 1992, I found myself in MEXICO. How beautiful the years when I was fortunate to live among them all.

I was leaving as a "missionary to foreign countries", as it was said at the time and even today most probably. Once among those "different" people, I came to realize that I was the "Stranger" coming to

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live among them. A "stranger warmly welcomed" by the Amerindians, the Rwandans, and the Mexicans. What wonderful riches they have shared with me: their prayer, their spirituality, their music and their songs, their celebrations and their family life and also their work... etc... Such riches still nourish me today.

In today's multi-cultural societies, the person that we look upon as a "stranger" is a sister or a brother who is different from us and who has a right to be respected in his or her dignity as a human person.

I put an end to this sharing today, September 19, in the afternoon. This morning at Mass, the prayer was the following: "Lord, nobody is a stranger for you and no one is so far gone that you cannot help him. Do not forget the refugees, the exiled, the children separated from their parents. Put an end to their sufferings and give us, for those rejected by the world, the same love and respect that you have for them. This we ask you, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."


Yes, may it be so! ■

The knowledge that we belong to a common humankind and that this belonging is more fundamental than any other belonging has greatly changed my attitudes and my perception of the human being. It helped me to liberate myself from self-centered compulsions and from interior wounds; it prompted me to better accept those who are different, the "strangers", and even those who attack us, the "enemies". To go from selfishness to love, from slavery to freedom, from locking oneself up to being open to others, is to grow; it is the road to full human maturity.

We are all called to a liberation of the heart, to be open to others and to discover the very depths of our being, our common humanity. But such a liberation supposes a long journey, from the anguish and the self-centeredness dispositions in which we feel cut off from the others right up to a love that transforms us and allows us to help others to change themselves. Such a journey, we cannot accomplish by ourselves. It implies that we belong at one time or another to a group that helps everyone to live in harmony with the others, whether within the group or outside the group. [...]

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Welcoming the Youth

At our most recent North American general assembly, one of the questions posed was "How can we welcome more young people to Faith and Sharing?" The Cleveland Faith and Sharing team, like most communities, addresses this question every year while planning our annual retreat.

As part of our preparation for our annual retreat, our brochures are distributed to area high school campus ministers and at church youth groups. However, it has been our experience that it is the personal invitation to a young person to "Come and See" that has been the most effective way to welcome young people to Faith and Sharing. Many times, we have young people that come to our retreat with their family, but it is the grace of Faith and Sharing that keeps them coming back year after year.



We encourage our young people to become actively engaged in the experience by asking each person to take on an important responsibility during the retreat. Many of our young people are asked to be small group leaders; some are invited to assist with the children's program or to help with a core member. By taking on a responsibility, each person feels valued by the entire community.

We have one young lady who has been coming to Faith and Sharing with her family for many years. She was becoming less and less interested in making another retreat, and did not want to be a part of the community. She was late for every conference, small group meeting or other activity, sat at the back of the room and really did not participate in the group at all.

We asked her to be a small group leader and suddenly, everything changed. She was on time and up front for every conference, taking notes so that she would be an effective group leader. She was engaged and committed to helping her small group grow as a community. The adults in her group were committed to supporting her leadership but were prepared to step in should she need assistance. Her group members later commented that her sharing was thoughtful and insightful and she posed questions that encouraged everyone to participate in the sharing. By entrusting this responsibility to her, we all experienced one of the many gifts of Faith and Sharing.

So, as we continue to journey down this road, consider inviting the next young person you meet to "Come and See."

I Have Chosen to Continue my Work in this World

Introduction

I have chosen to pursue my work in this world, a world troubled by wars, earthquakes that happened at the beginning of the year, etc.

I was ready for the trip of my dreams, a trip to Rome in October 2010, a project that I had in mind since my childhood, and my ticket had already been bought. This happy event coincided with the beatification of Brother André. Robin, that I've known for the past twenty years and with whom I had made a wonderful trip to Niagara

Falls, had accepted to accompany me with her new friend Sylvie that I had met only once. But, suddenly, everything was shattered.

A matter of life or death

On Saturday, September 18th, I attended, as I usually did, the monthly meeting of Faith and Sharing. I ate a ham sandwich for lunch. I came back to the Centre and had, like most of the time, a couple of toasts to eat with a portion of chicken. Toward the end of the meal, I noticed that I had some difficulty swallowing it, a problem that I've been having during the past several years. But during the evening, I felt some sharp pains in my stomach. This happens often enough after each meal, but the pains tend to disappear with time. I did not dare take any medication, hoping that the discomfort would disappear by itself. I went to bed at my usual hour. But the pain was always there. I sat up in bed and did some exercises. The coordinator saw me and asked me what was wrong. I told him that the pain was always there. He suggested that I go to the St. Luke hospital not too far from here. I said yes; it was one o'clock in the morning. They discovered that I'd had three aspiration pneumonia. They set me up with an intravenous because of a very high fever. I was so sick that I felt very close to death. So, what should I do? I was in a state of great anxiety. I am scared. Is my life already over? I'm very sick and I don't know what to think. The following day, they take me back to my nursing home because I don't want to stay at St. Luke's. But that was not for long. I was coughing as though I was a two-pack-a-day smoker. I began to have a fever. They took me back to St. Luke's the same night because I was in a very serious condition.

I was highly agitated and was asking myself what was happening. I was really angry with myself. And talking to myself I would be saying: "Calm down, Jean-Eudes, control yourself". But I was in great pain.

September 23rd, the doctor at the St. Luke hospital talked to me trying to convince me that I should have a gastro-jejunostomy tube, a sort of probe or feeding tube. That had been suggested to me for the past ten years by the specialists at the Jacques-Viger Centre. But I was strongly against it. And what had I gone through the past several days? My doctor, Dr. Jacques Marchand and my nurse Francine from the CH Centre-Ville then came to see me that same day to ask me questions and to check with the doctors at St. Luke's. They were referring to my biological testament signed by two witnesses in which it is stated that I do not want to be revived. "DO YOU WANT TO DIE?" IS SUCH A QUESTION A CHOICE OR A THREAT? I ask myself. WHAT A QUESTION!!! I answer NO. An answer that would not have been the same a year ago because I was in a state of anxiety and feeling quite depressed.

Conclusion

Ever since I cannot eat, I live in solitude, I stay in my room and pass a lot of time in front of my computer and TV and I read and look back at what has happened. There's no doubt that people struck by brain paralysis have more difficulty in swallowing as I do, and with time the difficulty will increase.

It is not easy to be in such a condition and not taste the food that we enjoyed so much in the past, even though I already had some difficulty in eating. I'd say to myself: "I will accept to have that darn tube put in", but I always hesitated because I truly enjoyed the taste of a good coffee and of the delicious wine that André Paquette brought me free of charge every Friday when he came to help me have supper. I stroll through the streets of down town Montreal and see many restaurants and people savoring their food.

Jean Vanier tells us that community begins by a meal; also that the time for a meal is a time to get together. How many times in the Bible do we see people getting together to eat? The Last Supper was the scene of Jesus with his disciples. And it is during a meal that we enjoy the best moments of our lives. Think of a marriage, of Christmas, of an anniversary.

It is a difficult time for me. Before, my friends would come and share a meal with me and help me to eat. Now, I don't have as many visitors as before.

However, I must admit that I feel better since being fed by a tube. I have no more stomach pains, I feel less tired and I don't have to take three meals a day and I don't salivate as much as before. In everything, every rose has its thorn. I lost weight but I feel fine. Nevertheless, it's still difficult especially at meal times.

But the situation cannot be ignored and I must live it day by day and not worry about tomorrow. I must accept the different seasons of my life and not worry about tomorrow.

At Faith and Sharing Montreal this summer we were nourished by the "good bread" from the Table of God shared with us by Father Yvon Jutras, m.s.a. At the end of each talk, we were invited to reflect, either personally or within the prayer groups, how we were touched by the Word, from the Table of Creation to the Table of the Eucharist.

We began by being filled with wonder by the free gifts of God to nourish the body at the Table of Creation, the harmony created between creatures and the invitation made to man to grow. Then wonder also for the fruits of the Holy Spirit Jesus left us to bring us to the Table of the Kingdom.

Am I a good guest at the Table of Creation? What fruits would I like to see grow in me?

As for Moses and the Hebrew people, the Table of the Desert is present in our lives, in our Church: it is "the desire, the loss, the hunger for God". "It is the Table of Faith" he said. We must not wrap ourselves in nostalgia for the past, but see today buds opening up to new growth. One retreat participant expressed herself: "When my heart is <u>dry</u>, I know that a <u>desert rose</u> can flower there." Someone else felt called, like Father Jutras, "to focus on what is going well around me and in the world".

Am I asleep (seated) or alive (standing) in the deserts of my life, of my Church?

Next came the Table of Mercy, the day when, in the presence of Jesus, the "fragrance of the bread of forgiveness" wafted through all the gathering: the sinful woman offered her past life to Jesus as well as the best of herself. True regret is experienced in the heart: there is where Love lives and what Jesus looks at, not sin. Father Jutras told us that the wish to pardon puts pardon in our hearts; give ourselves time and respect the other's rhythm. Afterwards there was a strong invitation to go and meet the Lord, the Vine-grower, so that he could revive our dry, fragile stems through his Mercy.

The talk on the Beatitudes made several participants want to integrate these into their daily lives, for it is the Table of Happiness. Easy to say: happy those who mourn, etc. Speaking about suffering, which he took from Jean-Paul II, Father Jutras said that the person who unites his/her suffering to that of Jesus becomes a peacemaker and suffering which sometimes provokes death in God's plan often leads to a transformation of the heart, something that keeps our hearts in a spirit of joy.

The Table of Mary was not forgotten. She was standing at the foot of the cross and she is near the altar. She is the Eucharistic Woman; she gave us Jesus, she gives us the Living Bread.

Regarding the atmosphere and what made the retreat participants happy, everyone was delighted with the retreat. It was a Table of Grace and Love. Father Jutras' teaching, truly integrated in his life as a man and priest, was given simply with concrete examples, fruit, sand, a bust of Moses, sitting on the table. A priest, it was noticed, of great sensitivity and depth, with a delicate ability to reply to each person's questions. He was able to include everyone. A new widow at Faith and Sharing was impressed by the welcome and respect for each individual, regardless of age, nationality and physical condition.



At Faith and Sharing, they say there is always friendliness, fraternity and openness to others.

May we, and this is also the wish of Father Jutras, always remain in wonder, hope and love. Let us respond generously to the mission left to us by the Lord, to build the Vine of the Kingdom by revealing his Love. ■

Our Retreat, an Encounter



- Gaining a better understanding of love through sharing Christ and also receiving love through hugs and hearing the faith of others;
- I love the talks. They are heavenly!



Wanted: The Next French Coordinator

During the summer of 2007, I agreed to serve as the French North American Coordinator. The mandate is for a period of five years. Since then, I had the opportunity to meet outstanding people, people of Faith and Sharing. They were not the kind of people who made the headlines, but people who were committed, who dared to live the Gospel and to put forth the Word of God during the retreats or renewal sessions. The Faith and Sharing communities can be compared to the leaven that we put in the dough. Our society is not quite aware that they exist. However, as with other groups of faith, they are a necessity so as to prevent our world from becoming a "hardened dough", but on the contrary, becoming a delicious bread made fresh by hope, faith and charity.

And if you keep track of the years, you will notice that my mandate as coordinator finishes next summer. Another person will have to take over. I would ask the French groups of Faith and Sharing to come up with some suggestions as to who could be or would be available for that position.

But beforehand, it would be wise to know what the duties of a French North American Coordinator are.

In 1984, some "wise people" responsible for Faith and Sharing decided to form a corporation so as to establish a link among the communities. The official name is "Faith and Sharing Fédération Foi et Partage". So, as you can see by such a bilingual name and the word "Federation", that the Corporation was registered in Canada, a bilingual and federal country and very much so... Beyond its Canadian administrative dimension, the aim of the Corporation it to establish a link among all the various groups of Faith and Sharing that are in North America. We often talk about "North American Faith and Sharing". Being that the Faith and Sharing groups are found only in Canada and the United States, we could say "Universal Faith and Sharing"; but that would be quite pretentious...

The Corporation can gather funds, give out receipts for tax purposes and render many services. Its biggest task is the organization, about every three years, of a meeting or a retreat comprising members of all the Faith and Sharing groups, English and French.

To manage that corporation requires a board of directors like in all other corporations. Often, we prefer to say the "North American Committee". Following the restructuring adopted during the 2010 Summer, that committee is made up of 4 persons; they meet once a year.

- A **secretary**: Isabelle Frappier has accepted the position
- A French coordinator: It is me!
- An **English coordinator:** Presently Eileen McIlwee.
- A **spiritual advisor:** Father Jacques Pelletier with all his vast rich experience.



And what does such a committee do? Mainly:

- Manage the corporation, prepare the annual general meeting and meet once a year.
- Prepare the North American retreat every three years.
- Establish communication with the communities.

In other words, the French coordinator strives to give life to all Faith and Sharing groups.

Thus, I invite you to take the time for discernment, to pray and talk with the others in such a way that names of persons capable of fulfilling the position could be suggested. If a name does come up, please let me know. Discernment will be made by the North American Committee to choose my replacement before next summer. Thank you! To reach me:
